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this text presents a traveller s guide to deaf culture starting from the premise that deaf cultures have an important contribution to make to other academic disciplines and human lives in general within and outside deaf communities there is a need for an account of the new concept of deaf culture which enables readers to assess its place

alongside work on other minority cultures and multilingual discourses the book aims to assess the concepts of culture on their own terms and in their many guises and to apply these to deaf communities the author illustrates the pitfalls which have been created for those communities by the medical concept of deafness and contrasts this with his new concept of deafhood a process by which every deaf child family and adult implicitly explains their existence in the world to themselves and each other

setting a case study of deaf people s leisure practices in north west england within a wider examination of communal deaf leisure across britain this book offers new insights into a misunderstood and misrepresented community the book provides a detailed analysis of deaf people s leisure during the second half of the twentieth century which questions perceptions of deafness as a disability investigates the importance of shared leisure in community formation more generally and examines the ways in which changing patterns of socialisation are affecting british society although focusing on the british deaf community the concepts and principles explored in this book can be applied across a wide range of social cultural and ethnic groups this book draws upon a wide range of subject areas and will consequently be of interest to students and academics working in the fields of disability history community and cultural minority studies sport leisure and regional studies

Deaf people evolving perspectives in psychology, sociology, and education is an examination of the psychology of the deaf community through history, current topics, and the personal experiences of the three deaf authors. This text provides a unique perspective in that the topic of psychology and deaf people is typically presented through the hearing person's perspective, the deaf person's perspective as this book demonstrates is important because it is the deaf community that is most impacted by the decisions professionals make, whether in school, in the clinic, or in the family. Case studies are presented throughout the text to demonstrate real-life issues, and end-of-chapter study questions help reinforce chapter concepts.

Long gone are the days when a deaf person is expected to struggle through a healthcare consultation with a health professional who has inadequate deaf awareness. Legislation now dictates that the onus is on the health professional to utilize the right communication skills. Deafness is very common, meaning that health professionals, whatever their specialist area, can expect to encounter a client with deafness or hearing loss on a daily basis. Working with deaf people is intended for use as a general reference manual offering practical advice on how to prepare for the consultation with clients who are deaf or deafblind. Information is offered about language, communication, and culture. Case studies demonstrate how the messages can be applied in practice. Every health professional, medical and nursing student, whatever their discipline and whatever country they work in, should have a copy of this book.
